MEMBERSHIP REPORT

Condolences to Zelma Millman's family:

Zelma Millman died on August 29 at home following a lengthy illness. She was 92. She was born on May 28, 1916, to Theodore and Etta Lawrence. She graduated from Westport High School and later earned a BS degree in psychology at the University of Missouri, where she was a member of Mortar Board and voted to Who's Who in America's Colleges and Universities. She also earned an MS degree in psychology at Northwestern University.

In 1940 she married Daniel S. Millman, a prominent attorney and civic leader, and shared his commitment to the People to People (PTPI) organization, created by President Eisenhower. Mr. Millman headed the first local PTPI chapter (in Kansas City) and later became chairman of the board of trustees and board of directors of PTPI.

Zelma served on the board of trustees of People to People International, as chair of the Kansas City Sister City Committee of Tainan City, Taiwan, R.O.C. (Republic of China), and was also on the boards of the Sister City Association of Kansas City and the Sister City Commission of Kansas City. Zelma was also an early and avid environmentalist, serving for more than 30 years as secretary of the Missouri board of the Nature Conservancy.

For 26 years, she was a docent at the Kansas City Zoo. At the age of 85 she joined Uplift, the local project that feeds the homeless. She was the oldest volunteer and continued until her health deteriorated at 89. She is survived by Lawrence Millman, Cambridge, Mass., and Barbara Millman, Lakewood, Colo.

GKCPTP extends our condolences to Zelma's family.

SPONSORSHIP MATTERS

Helpful Reminders for Sponsoring International Military Students (IMS):

International military students and their families participate in the programs of the U.S. Command and General Staff College at the invitation of the US Army. While sponsorship as a member of GKCPTP is managed by our chapter, we ultimately fall under the "command" of the U.S. Army's International military student division (IMSD). Our actions must support the IMS and their family in a manner which brings credit to the sponsorship program. In addition, GKCPTP members are to follow published guidelines based on chapter by-laws and conduct themselves in a manner consistent with the mission of GKCPTP.

- Attend sponsor orientation sessions. IMSD representative(s) provide valuable information about the upcoming year at orientation sessions.
- Communicate with your Leavenworth/Lansing and military sponsors. IMSD holds ice breaker sessions shortly after the officers arrive. The ice breaker is a good opportunity to talk about sponsor preferences for attending the IMS/sponsor events (food fairs and holiday dinner/dance) hosted by the Fort.
- Attend only those events which you have an official invitation for. While an informal invitation to an event (e.g., by an IMS or spouse) may be welcomed and even helpful to the officer and his or her spouse, the military's program guidelines must still be observed.

- Respect the law while on post: the military is not as forgiving as the highway patrol. For example, going 5 miles over the speed limit will typically not be overlooked. Do not drive under the influence. Use of mobile phones is not allowed when driving on post.

Occasionally the chapter hears that a few officers have not seen their sponsors most of or all year. Our guideline is that a sponsor should see the officer on an average of about once a month. There are many factors which might make this guideline difficult to follow.

If more than 2 months have passed since your last get together with your IMS, the relationship may be characterized more accurately as one of polite recognition. When sponsors, officers and their families begin to bond early, it helps increase the chances of friendship and greater depth in the relationship. Also, you cannot expect to bond with every officer you sponsor.

Our goal is to be a helpful resource; we hope to help ensure that sponsorship will be a rewarding international experience for you. Sponsors count on one another to uphold their sponsorship responsibilities. Thank you for doing your part!

PTPI CHANGES PERCEPTIONS

One recent evening, Linda and I invited Ethan Steinberg and Mario Lopez, two young men who were serving as summer interns for People to People International, to join us at the welcoming event for international officers attending the US Army Command and General Staff College for the coming academic year. Linda and I were hosting Ethan in a homestay while Mario was staying next door with Bill and Peggy Parolin, also GKCPTP members.

Mario is preparing for his third year of college in Mexico; and unknown to us, this was his first up-close and personal exposure to leaders of armed forces. On the way home, he spoke of his impressions at length and how his preconceptions had been altered.

Mario is a remarkable young man. I asked him if he would put some of his thoughts into writing for an article for "CONTACT," our chapter newsletter. He readily agreed and his remarks are below. I believe his comments reaffirm why so many of us support the IMS program.

NEW INSIGHTS ON THE MILITARY

As a 20-year old Mexican and college student, I have always seen war as a threat, a problem in which no one would like to be involved. I have always wondered, "What could someone be thinking that would make him decide to lead a group of people whose main purpose is to disturb others' lives?"

Fortunately, I recently had the opportunity to see this issue from a very different perspective and learn that there is much more to consider when you are forming an opinion about war and its leaders.

During my internship at People to People International headquarters, I had the opportunity to meet outstanding people whose main interest is to spread understanding and knowledge in order to achieve peace. Gene and Linda Jacobs are these kind of people. In their attempt to show me more about American culture and about the world, they helped me to grow as a person and to realize that sometimes things are very different from what you initially think.

I had the opportunity to visit Fort Leavenworth with the Jacobs during a welcoming event held in honor of visiting international officers. At this icebreaker event, the international officers that will spend at least one year in Kansas City receiving military training, meet their sponsors and their host families. While there, I was able to talk to the officers from Mexico, Spain, Poland, Trinidad and Tobago among others. During these small chats, I was also able to meet the officers' families, share in their excitement, as well as their fears.

By the end of the day I had discovered that these people were not the malicious group I had imagined. They were human beings, trying to be better at what they do and giving to their families new opportunities and experiences. I was aware that the war issue was still there, nevertheless, I also realized that if these officers were going to share a whole year together, there were big chances for them to become good friends and then may decide to fight for a change once they were back at home.

The most interesting thing about this program, in which People to People plays a crucial role, is that it offers a unique opportunity for countries in enmity to share the same table during dinner or to visit the same place on a weekend. What I think is going on here is what PTPI fights for; they are helping to achieve peace through the understanding of people, families and officers. These visitors might help to bring peace while they are being trained for the opposite.

I wanted to share my learning and my thoughts on this, first to point out the work People to People is doing, working on a program that may seem far apart from their mission, but that in a way is very much about it. And finally, I decided to write this because I wanted to recognize the excellent job that the Jacobs and many other PTP members are doing to bring about peace through understanding.

I am sure that this experience is just one in a million and that all over the world there are groups of people as committed and hard working as the ones that I met in Kansas City. There is no doubt that we all, together, are going to continue working for the change that People to People has tried to accomplish for the last 53 years.
