A Special Message from Mike Brettman to Sponsors

Mike planned to talk to those attending the annual Sponsor Recognition Ceremony, but like other events the pandemic caused a cancellation for this year. We do have his heartfelt message here for you to read.

Dear Sponsors,

Recently we were supposed to have our Sponsor Recognition Ceremony for this year. I had asked Jim to let me speak at the ceremony about sponsorship since I am a few days from retirement but the pandemic has not allowed that to happen.

I want to thank all of the sponsors for the support you have given the program over the years. It is an important part of the International Military Student experience here at Fort Leavenworth, as you all know. It breaks down barriers that have been created by media, politics and stereotypes. Many of you create life-long friendships that endure during many of the world events that divide us by country and ethnicity. Even if you disagree with the political leaders, the memories of good times serve as a bond that cannot be broken by current events.

Many of you have also become friends with my family and me over the years. We appreciate the kindness and friendship you have shown us over the years and hope to sponsor with many of you in the future as we join you in sponsorship.

During the last 17 years I have made a few observations that I would like to share with you. When I took over the sponsorship program, we began to have the officers fill out sponsor surveys three times a year. This gave the officers a voice in sponsorship since they are the main focus of the program. I believe the surveys have improved the quality of sponsorship. Over the years I have categorized sponsors into four distinct groups:

- The *first group* of sponsors comprises those that sign up to become sponsors, but then do very little for the officers assigned to them. The surveys expose them very quickly and they usually drop out after a year or two.

- The *second group* of sponsors takes good care of their officers, but struggle to get along with their co-sponsors. For them the number of times they see their officer versus the other sponsors is a contest. Instead of the IMS and family being the focus for the year the sponsor is keeping score. If there are any changes to the sponsor program these sponsors lament that things are not the way they used to be.
- The *third group* of sponsors contains great sponsors that focus on their IMS and get along with their co-sponsors. They do not complain about changes to the program and are cheerful people to be around. The only stipulation they have is they want to sponsor officers from one region year after year or they threaten their coordinators that they will not sponsor.
- The *fourth group* of sponsors comprises the absolute best sponsors. They are team players with their co-sponsors, never complain about changes to the program and make the officer the focus of the year. Most of the events they hold include the other sponsors. They are also willing to take officers from around the world regardless of ethnicity, region or religion.

Please ask yourselves what type of sponsors you are and what type you want to be. Catherine and I will strive to be in the fourth group. We have had hundreds of officers over to our house in the last 20 years from every region in the world. I hope we can sponsor with many of you.

The last item I would like to cover is the serious civilian-military division in the United States. All of the IMS have a U.S. officer serving as their student ambassador while they are at Fort Leavenworth. Some of our sponsors have military experience but many do not.

I urge you to include the student ambassador in some of your events with your IMS. That will let you get to know your own armed forces. Ask them about military life and where they have served. Most of them are here without any family support also. They are the ones that deploy for us and leave their families behind.

I thank you all again for sponsoring the IMS and we hope to see you often in the future.
